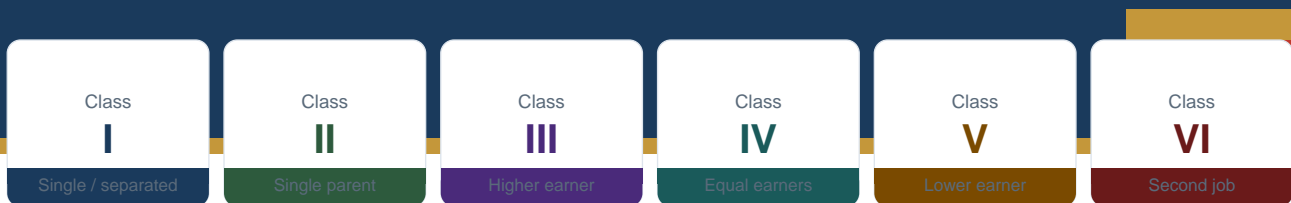

German Tax Class — What It Is, How to Choose, How to Change

For Expats in Germany | Married Couples | Family Reunification | 2026 Edition



Why it matters

Your Steuerklasse determines your monthly net take-home pay.

Wrong class = overpaying every month.

Who can change it?

Anyone married or registered as life partner can choose III/V or IV/IV.

Change takes effect next payslip.

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1 The 6 Steuerklassen Explained

Every employee in Germany is assigned one of six tax classes

- Steuerklasse I** — Single, separated, widowed, or divorced
 -> The default class for anyone who is not married or not in a registered partnership. Also applies to non-resident spouses living abroad.
- Steuerklasse II** — Single parent (Alleinerziehend) with at least one child
 -> You must receive child benefit (Kindergeld) and the child must live in your household. You receive an additional tax relief of EUR 4,260/yr (2026).
- Steuerklasse III** — Higher-earning spouse in a married couple
 -> Lowest tax deduction rate. Combined with Class V for the lower-earning spouse. Best when one spouse earns significantly more (roughly 60/40 split or higher).
- Steuerklasse IV** — Both spouses earn similarly (equal earner combination)
 -> Both partners are in Class IV. Each is taxed as if single. Best when both earn similar amounts. Can be combined with the Faktor (factor) method for even more precision.
- Steuerklasse V** — Lower-earning spouse (paired with Class III partner)
 -> Highest tax deduction rate — significantly higher withholding than Class I. Mandatory annual tax return required.
- Steuerklasse VI** — Second job or additional income source
 -> Applied to any second employment contract. No tax-free allowance at all. Highest withholding rate. Cannot be avoided for a second job.

Important — Steuerklasse only affects your monthly withholding

Your Steuerklasse does NOT change how much total tax you owe for the year — only how much is deducted each month from your payslip. The final tax liability is settled in the annual Steuererklärung. However, choosing the optimal class means more money in your pocket each month rather than waiting for a refund the following year.

Which Class is Right for Your Situation?

Use this decision guide to identify your optimal Steuerklasse.

Your Situation	Optimal Class	Why
Single, no children	Class I	Default. No choices to make.
Single parent, child in household	Class II	Apply for Alleinerziehend status. Extra EUR 4,260 relief/yr.
Married, you earn 60%+, spouse earns 40% or less	Class III / V	You take III (low withholding), spouse takes V. Maximises your monthly net pay.
Married, both earn similar amounts	Class IV / IV	Equal treatment. Consider adding the Faktor method for even more accuracy.
Married, both earn similar, want precision	Class IV + Faktor	The Finanzamt calculates an individual factor. Most accurate monthly withholding.
You have a second job	Class VI	Mandatory for 2nd contract. No choices available.
Non-EU spouse living abroad (not in Germany yet)	Class I	Until spouse arrives and registers in Germany, you remain in Class I.

III/V vs. IV/IV — The Critical Marriage Decision

This single choice affects your monthly take-home pay every month. Get it right.

Class III / V

Class III (higher earner)

- + Very low monthly withholding
- + Higher net pay each month
- + Spouse must take Class V

! Annual return MANDATORY

* Best: salary ratio 60/40+

Class IV / IV

Class IV / IV (both)

- + Each taxed as if single
- + Balanced monthly pay
- No mandatory return (usually)
- + Can add Faktor for precision

Best: similar salaries

Real Example: Salary EUR 4,500 (Partner A) + EUR 2,500 (Partner B) — monthly net pay

Scenario	Partner A net/mo	Partner B net/mo	Combined net/mo	Difference
Both Class I (before marriage)	~EUR 2,990	~EUR 1,780	~EUR 4,770	Baseline
Both Class IV / IV	~EUR 2,985	~EUR 1,778	~EUR 4,763	~EUR -7/mo
Class III (A) + Class V (B)	~EUR 3,380	~EUR 1,520	~EUR 4,900	+EUR 137/mo
Class IV + Faktor (both)	~EUR 2,990	~EUR 1,790	~EUR 4,780	+EUR 10/mo
AFTER annual tax return (III/V couple)	Equalised	Equalised	~EUR 4,780	Same as IV/IV

Key insight — III/V gives more cash monthly, IV/IV is more balanced

Class III/V gives the higher earner significantly more take-home pay each month. However, the lower-earning spouse in Class V has very high deductions. The total annual tax bill is the same either way — the difference is only in monthly timing. If you choose III/V, the mandatory annual tax return simply redistributes what was already owed. Choose III/V if you need maximum monthly cash flow. Choose IV/IV if you want balanced monthly pay and no mandatory return.

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How to Change Your Steuerklasse — Step by Step

The process is simpler than most people think. Takes effect the following month.

- Check your eligibility — only married or registered life partners can choose their class
-> Single people are automatically in Class I or II. Cohabiting couples (not married) cannot choose III/V.
- Download the Antrag auf Steuerklassenwechsel bei Ehegatten / Lebenspartnern
-> Available at [finanzamt.de](https://www.finanzamt.de) or your local Finanzamt. The form is free. Both spouses must sign it.

- Fill in both spouses' details — name, address, Steuer-ID, employer, desired class
-> The Steuer-ID (tax identification number) is on any previous tax correspondence or on your Steuerbescheid.
- Submit to your local Finanzamt — in person, by post, or via ELSTER (online)
-> ELSTER is the fastest method. Register at elster.de if not already registered. Free service.
- The change takes effect from the month AFTER submission
-> If you submit in March, the new class applies from April payroll onwards. Your employer receives electronic notification.
- You can change class once per year (calendar year limitation)
-> Since 2020, you may only change Steuerklasse once per calendar year — except in the case of death, divorce, or separation.
Exception: if one spouse becomes unemployed during the year, a mid-year change is permitted.
- Your employer does NOT need to be informed separately
-> The Finanzamt notifies your employer electronically through the ELStAM system. Nothing for you to do after submission.

Tip — ELSTER is the fastest and most reliable method

Submit via elster.de and you receive confirmation the same day. The Finanzamt processes ELSTER submissions faster than paper. Keep the confirmation email as proof of your submission date.

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Changing Steuerklasse After Getting Married in Germany

What to do immediately after the wedding — and the deadlines

- After the wedding, both spouses are initially placed in Class IV automatically
-> Germany automatically assigns Class IV to both newly married partners. You must actively apply if you want III/V.
- Collect your Heiratsurkunde (marriage certificate) from the Standesamt
-> Usually issued on or shortly after the wedding day. You will need certified copies for multiple official processes.
- Register your new marital status at the Einwohnermeldeamt if your address changed
-> Update your Anmeldung if you have moved in together. Your tax ID remains the same — no change needed at Finanzamt for that.
- Submit the Antrag auf Steuerklassenwechsel to your local Finanzamt
-> Include: completed form (both signed), copies of marriage certificate, both Steuer-IDs. Can submit via ELSTER or in person.
- Deadline: submit by November 30 to take effect from January 1 next year
-> If you miss November 30, the new class takes effect in the year after next. There is no backdating.
Do not wait — submit as soon as possible after the wedding.
- Inform your employer's HR department of your new marital status
-> Although the Finanzamt notifies employers electronically, proactively informing HR avoids payroll delays.
- If married abroad — additional steps required
-> Foreign marriage certificates must be apostilled and officially translated by a sworn German translator before submission.

For expats married abroad — include a certified German translation

Marriage certificates from Pakistan, Kuwait, UAE, or any non-German-speaking country must be officially translated by a beeidigter Uebersetzer (sworn translator) and apostilled in the country of issue before the Finanzamt will accept them. Allow 2-4 weeks for translation and apostille. The Finanzamt will not process the application without these.

6 Family Reunification — Spouse and Children Arriving in Germany

Tax class changes when your family joins you from abroad

- Spouse receives visa and arrives in Germany — first steps
 - > As soon as your spouse arrives, prioritise *Anmeldung* (registration) at the *Einwohnermeldeamt* within 14 days of moving in.
- Spouse's *Anmeldung* triggers your eligibility to change *Steuerklasse*
 - > Without the spouse's German registration, you cannot apply for III/V even if legally married. The *Anmeldung* is the trigger.
- Submit *Antrag auf Steuerklassenwechsel* immediately after *Anmeldung*
 - > Do not wait. Submit the same week. The sooner you submit, the sooner your monthly net pay increases.
- Spouse's own *Steuerklasse* depends on their employment status in Germany
 - > If spouse is not working: no *Steuerklasse* assigned yet. If spouse takes a job: Class I initially, then change to V (if you are III) or IV (if IV/IV).
- Children arriving — register for *Kindergeld* immediately **[EUR 255/child/mo]**
 - > Apply for *Kindergeld* at the *Familienkasse* as soon as children are registered in Germany. EUR 255/month per child (2026). *Kindergeld* is not income-dependent.
- Check if you qualify for *Kinderfreibetrag* (child tax allowance)
 - > EUR 6,612 per child per year (2026). Applied in the annual tax return. More beneficial than *Kindergeld* for higher earners — *Finanzamt* calculates which is better.
- Spouse not yet working — you may still qualify for Class III
 - > A non-working spouse registered in Germany qualifies you for Class III. You do not both need to be employed.
- Non-EU spouses — ensure *Aufenthaltstitel* (residence permit) is obtained
 - > The residence permit confirms legal right to reside. Without it, some benefits and the *Anmeldung*-based *Steuerklasse* change may be delayed.

Important — timeline matters enormously

Every month you delay submitting the *Antrag* after your spouse's *Anmeldung* is a month of higher tax withholding. For a couple earning EUR 4,500 + EUR 0 (non-working spouse), switching to Class III saves approximately EUR 350-450 per month in withholding. Over a year, that is EUR 4,200-5,400 that stays in your account rather than sitting with the *Finanzamt* until your tax return.

7 The Annual Tax Return (*Steuererklärung* / *Pflichtveranlagung*)

Who must file, who should file, and what to expect

- Class III/IV couples MUST file an annual tax return — it is mandatory
-> *The Pflichtveranlagung ensures the combined tax bill is correctly settled after year-end. No exceptions.*
- Class IV/IV couples are generally not required to file — but usually should
-> *If you have deductible expenses (Werbungskosten, Sonderausgaben) you will likely get a refund. Most expats benefit from filing.*
- Deadline: July 31 of the following year (or February 28 with a Steuerberater)
-> *If you use a certified tax adviser (Steuerberater), the deadline extends to the end of February of the second year.*
- File via ELSTER (free), tax software (EUR 15-40), or a Steuerberater (EUR 150-500)
-> *ELSTER is free and official. Wiso, TaxFix, and Smartsteuer are popular software options. English-speaking Steuerberater recommended for expats.*
- What you can deduct — Werbungskosten (work-related expenses)
-> *Home office, work tools, professional development, commuting costs (EUR 0.30/km), union fees, professional literature.*
- Sonderausgaben (special expenses)
-> *Health insurance contributions, pension contributions, Riester/Ruerup savings, charitable donations, childcare costs.*
- Double taxation — income earned abroad before moving to Germany
-> *Germany has double taxation treaties (DBA) with Pakistan, UAE, Kuwait, and most countries. Income already taxed abroad may be exempt or creditable.*
- Expected refund for a Class III/IV couple filing on time
-> *Most III/IV couples receive a refund rather than paying extra, since the withholding is calculated conservatively.*

Tip — always file, even if not mandatory

The average German tax refund is EUR 1,095 per year. For expats with deductible expenses (professional development, commuting, dual household, childcare), refunds of EUR 1,500-3,000 are common. Filing takes 2-4 hours with good software.

Net Pay Impact — Steuerklasse Comparison (2026 Estimates)

Common Mistakes — and How to Avoid Them

These are the errors that cost expats the most money each year.

Mistake	Cost	How to fix it
Not switching from I to III after spouse arrives	EUR 300-500/mo	Submit Antrag immediately after spouse's Anmeldung
Staying in IV/IV when income split is 60/40+	EUR 100-200/mo	Switch to III/V for the higher earner
Not filing annual return as III/V couple	Penalty fine	File by July 31 — mandatory for III/V
Using outdated or unofficial Steuerklasse change form	Rejected application	Download current form from finanzamt.de or use ELSTER
Forgetting to submit apostilled marriage certificate	Rejected application	Apostille in country of issue + certified German translation
Missing the November 30 deadline for January change	1 year delay	Submit as early as possible — do not wait until November
Not applying for Kindergeld after children arrive	EUR 255/child/mo lost	Apply at Familienkasse immediately after child's Anmeldung
Assuming the Finanzamt will make changes automatically	Months of overpaying	Nothing is automatic — you must submit the Antrag yourself

Quick Reference — Key Deadlines and Rules

Once/year	How often you can change Steuerklasse (except divorce/death/job loss)
Nov 30	Deadline to submit change for it to apply from January 1 next year
Next month	How quickly the change takes effect after submission
14 days	How long your spouse has to complete Anmeldung after arriving
July 31	Annual tax return deadline for III/V couples (mandatory)
Feb 28	Extended deadline with a registered Steuerberater
EUR 255/mo	Kindergeld per child in 2026 (applied at Familienkasse)
EUR 6,612/yr	Kinderfreibetrag (child tax allowance) per child in 2026
EUR 4,260/yr	Additional tax relief for Class II (Alleinerziehend) in 2026
bmf-steuerrechner.de	Official German government net pay calculator — use this for exact figures
